SEMINAR HIGHLIGHTS

INVITED SPEAKERS

As in previous years, a select group of distinguished scholars in the field of language education will present papers and workshops at the RELC Seminar. This year, the internationally known invited speakers are Sara Cotterall (Japan), Gavin Dudeney (UK), Hermann Funk (Germany), Andrew Littlejohn (Oman), David Mendelsohn (Canada), Ng Seok Moi (Singapore), Rebecca Oxford (USA), Martha Pennington (USA), George Pickering (UK), Nilda Sunga (Philippines) and Michael Swan (UK).

SPECIAL INTEREST GROUP

This year's Seminar has a Special Interest Group or SIG concerned with 'Languages in Early Education' in which representatives of the SEAMEO member countries will present the use of language in early education in their respective countries.

The aim is to discuss the effects or impact of existing language policies on education in multilingual societies and to share best practices in the teaching of vernacular languages and the English language in multilingual education systems

Areas of focus will include bilingual and multilingual education, language as a tool of national identity, language and culture, language planning, developing materials and methodologies for teaching vernacular languages, and learning and teaching strategies for mother tongue education




